Fremont St. in northeastern Portland is a beautifully designed building emblematic of the city's pioneering support for recycling and reuse in the building materials sector. The façade of the ReBuilding Center has salvaged doors, windows and molds, a colorful display of used building materials sold at discounted prices inside the store's 53,000-square-foot warehouse. The ReBuilding Center, a pioneer in recycling and salvage of building materials, has been at the center of a boom in economic development along the Mississippi Avenue corridor. The street buzzes about boutiques, breweries, hip restaurants such as Por Que No and Blue Star Donuts and numerous newly built residential units. But there is also the downside of development for the iconic trade, which opened in 2000. Sales have been flat for the past five years. Stephen Reichard, ceo, who joined the nonprofit in July 2015. The reason for lackluster sales is not what you would initially expect; Reichard blames the lack of accessible street parking near the store, which is the impact of gentrification and economic development in the area. It's getting harder and harder to park in the neighborhood. There has been a measurable drop in sales, reichard says. This is a serious problem for a nonprofit organization; it is impossible for customers to transport most of the store's materials, which include salvaged bathtubs, chairs, tables, no vehicles. Only limited online parking is available. There is no denying the fact that ReBuilding Center faces increased competition from several new businesses in Portland that sell salvaged timber. But Reichard maintains the main challenge for the center is the lack of parking. It's a question that has forced the CEO to consider moving. It is raising funds for a feasibility study that would look at resettlement options. Meanwhile, Reichard is looking at ways to diversify the nonprofit's revenue streams. One of his strategies is to increase philanthropic support to 10% of revenues. When he joined the organization, philanthropic support didn't exist. Last year it was 4%. This year it has grown to 6%-7%. The center recently received grants from the Murdock Charitable Foundation to create an online sales and inventory system so the company can expand its reach to customers outside portland. The business also benefits from a city ordinance that came into force last year that requires homes built before 1916 to be rebuilt. A large part of ReBuilding Center's business comes from homes and rescue materials. We need to increase rescue materials on the market and increase demand. It should be prescribed, Reichard says. Reichard is also considering increasing educational classes, such as carpentry workshops for children and adults. The workshops are part of a nonprofit's rebranding from simply reusing the building materials trade to reusing cementing its mission as a vehicle to strengthen the social fabric of the community in which it is located. The saving grace for the organization is that it owns the premises of the store, an acre and a half of property that spans the entire block between N. Fremont St. and N. Beech St. It is an extremely valuable property, reichard admits. Ironically, the neighborhood that helped revitalize and strengthen it is the same community that could soon force it to go.
